

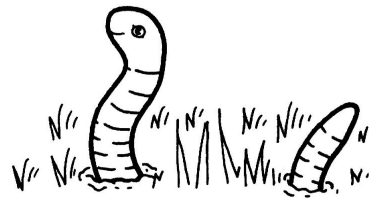
Tunnel Travels

A worm makes tunnels by pushing its way into the soil and eating it.

As the worm moves forward, its body coats the soil with slime!

Glue this to the back of the last section of the first strip.

The slime makes the soil stronger.



Worm tunnels make airy spaces in the soil.

Cut out each strip as one piece (four total). Glue as indicated. Fold like an accordion (back and forth). Glue back of last piece to your lapbook.

Glue this to the back of the last section of the second strip.

The spaces help rainwater drain.

As it drains, the soil becomes looser and finer, so it is easier for plants to grow.



Glue this to the back of the last section of the third strip.

Some worms burrow deeper underground when the weather is too cold or too dry.

They push down a few feet below the surface, then coil up and go to sleep.
