Shear the goat.

Wash the wool.

Comb the wool.

Glue Here

Use a spindle to spin the
wool into yarn.

Dye the yarn using colors
from plants.

Weave the rug on a loom.

Cut on solid lines. Glue strips together at tab. Accordion fold with cover on top. Draw pictures describing the process of making a rug.

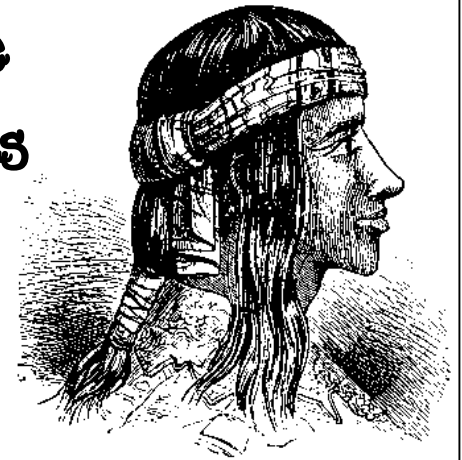
Info:

The Navajo live on reservations, which are located in the northeastern corner of Arizona, a small part of Utah, and a part of New Mexico. Window Rock is located in Arizona. A reservation is a piece of land that is owned by one of the various Native American tribes but is held in trust by the government. The Navajo reservation was created in 1868 and is the largest in the United States. The land is combination of desert, deep canyons, and tall mountains.

SAMPLES

If you would like to dye some wool, or maybe even mohair, you could store the pieces in this pocket. Use natural materials, such as those in the story, dry, and attach to a card that you label.

Boil any of the following ingredients to get colored desired:

Reddish Brown – onion skins

Red – beet juice

Yellow – marigolds

Tan – coffee or tea

Gold – turmeric

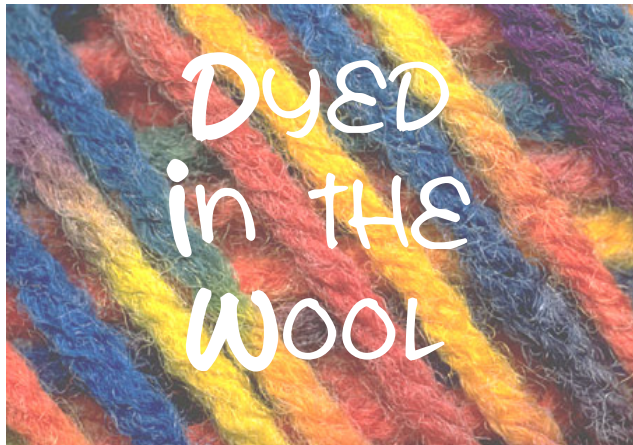
Blue/Purple – berries

Dip fiber in colored water. The longer it soaks, the darker it will get. After you take it out, squeeze the excess water out and drip dry. After it is dry, attach to card, label, and store in pocket.

Pocket Book Instructions: Cut on solid lines. Mountain fold on dotted lines. The bottom flap is a pocket. Put a small line of glue down the wrong sides of the pocket. Store cards inside pocket.
