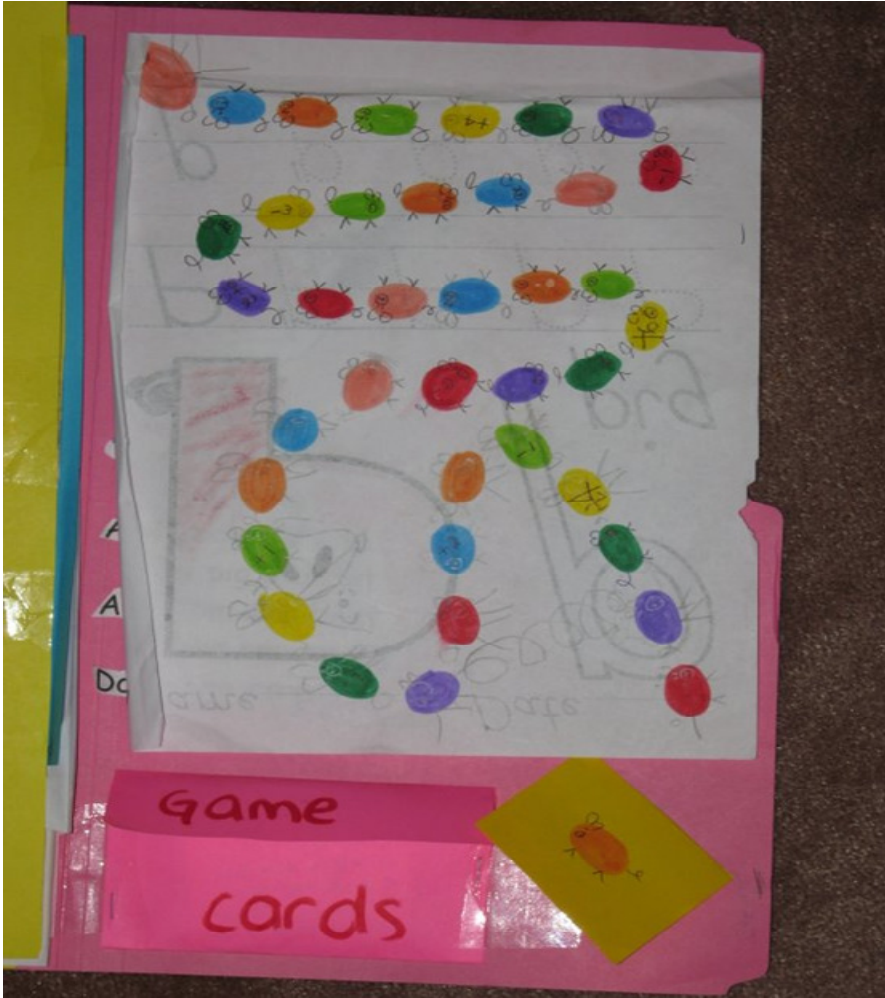


# Pig Game



Supplies:

Piece of paper

Ink Pads (for stamping fingerprints)

Storage Pocket

Cards

(you will need to make your own)

I made a pig game board out of fingerprint shaped colored ovals, then I drew on a snout, ears, eyes, legs and a tail. Then I made game cards. I did math problems. My son reads them, figures out the correct answer and then gets to roll the dice and move ahead. At various points on the game board add some math along the way to make it interesting (for example, write +2 on one space and -4 on another. Write "draw a card" on various pigs on the board (or designate certain colors for card drawing — for example, if you land on a red or yellow pig, you draw a card).

For the cards:

Most were based on simple addition and subtraction with numbers below 20. I used farm words and pig words and varied the way the questions were written. I hand wrote them out so there were 16 per page. One page of subtraction, One page of addition. HOWEVER, based on the age of the child the game cards could be written by the parent to be age appropriate.

Sample Cards:

There are 2 pigs in the field and 6 pigs in the barn. How many pigs are there on the farm?

There are 6 pigs in the pig pen and 2 pigs in the field. How many pigs are there on the farm?

There are 10 pigs in the barn. The farmer puts 2 pigs into the field. How many pigs are left in the barn?
