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











Cut out book as one piece. Fold in half. Color the kittens. Under the flaps, list the differences between the kittens.











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Cut book out. Fold on dotted lines (matchbook style) Color pictures (previous page). Cut them out and paste them inside the matchbook.

And I'll tell you something about that, no one Knows it less than my cat.



My Cat, Mrs. Lick-A Chin

Cut pockets out as one piece. Fold back up. Wrap flaps around the back and glue down. Glue in lapbook. Cut out the "Counting Cats" cards and glue them on 4X6 index cards or print on cardstock. Laminate if desired. Store in the pocket along with 4 popsicle sticks. To play "Counting Cats" spread the pictures of cats out and put the cards with numbers face down in a stack. Have your child draw a card and make it using the cat cards. For example, for two cats he should pick two cat cards to illustrate "2 cats". Then have him show the same amount with the popsicle sticks to imitate tally marks and also show it on

his left hand (hold up two fingers). This is based on the Right Start mathematics program.



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
