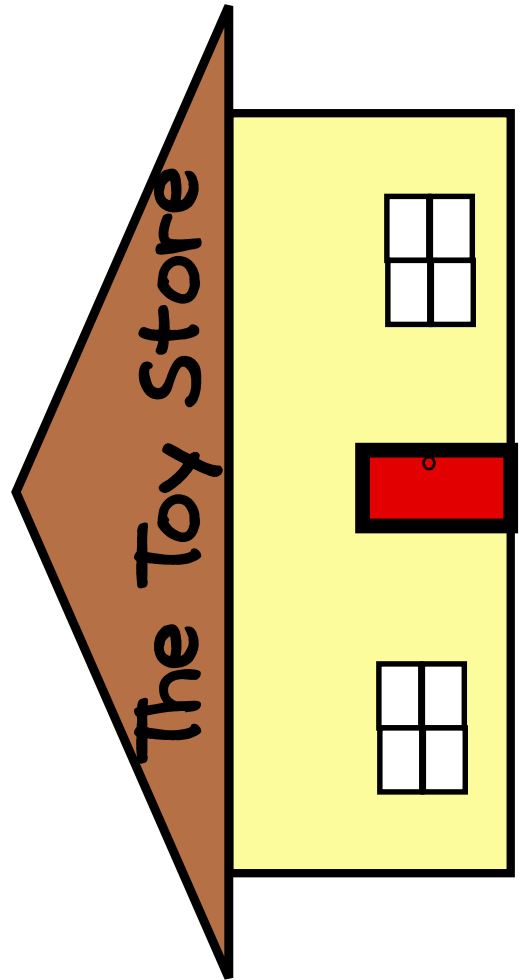

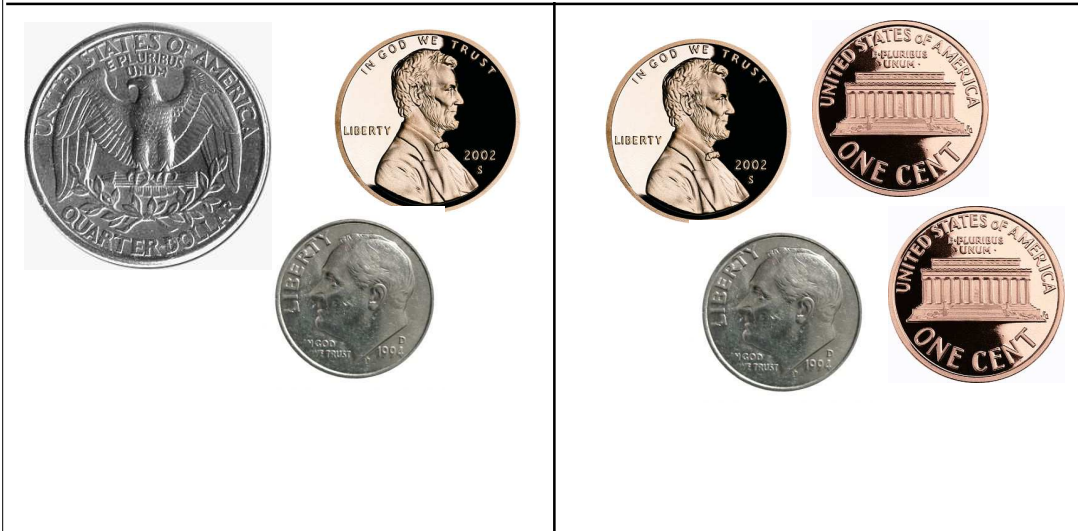

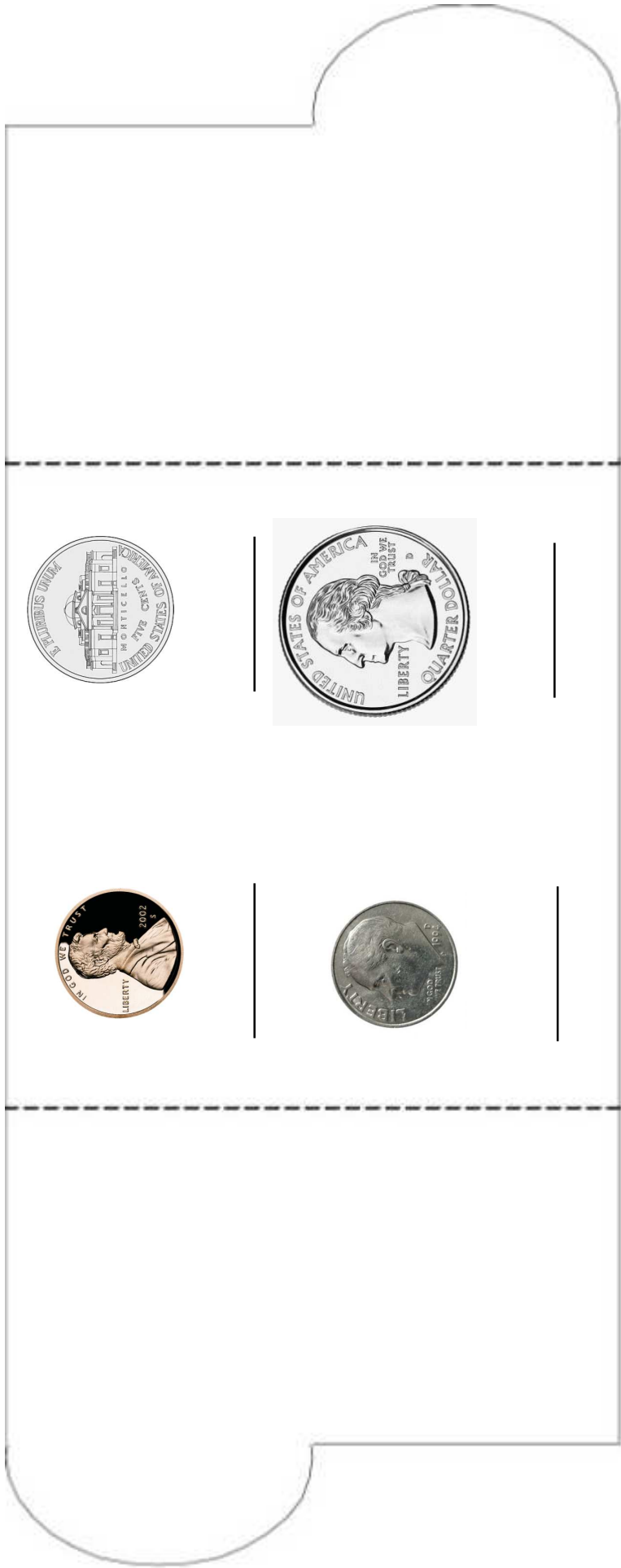

Cut out the pages and stack them with the longest in the back and the smallest on top. Staple at the top and have your child fill in the information on each man. For an extended activity, you could use your fake money as a model and have your child draw a copy of each bill or coin on the facing page.

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Cut out the three circles. Fold each one in half.

Glue the back of the left half of the first circle to the front of the left half of the second circle.

Take the third circle. Glue the back of the left half of the third circle to the back of the right half of the first circle. Fold so that you can open the book once to the right and once to the left. So, the middle section is actually the front of your book.
