Emily Elizabeth Dickinson, an American poet, was born in Amherst, Massachusetts on December 10, 1830 to a prominent family. She lived a reclusive life, choosing to spend most of her time in her bedroom reading and writing poetry. Publishers often edited her poems because they did not fit the conventional poetic rules of the time. They usually lacked titles, had short lines, and oftentimes unconventional capitalization and punctuation. She wrote nearly 1800 poems in her lifetime, most of which were not published until after her death on May 15, 1886.
